OPERATIONS S-3:

The last few months have found the World Famous "Flying Tigers" extending our professional reputation throughout the Pacific Theater as we achieved a myriad of operational accomplishments.

April began with the Operations Department

executing a successful embarkation of HMM-262(REIN) aircraft aboard Amphibious Ready Group (ARG) shipping for the transit to the Republic of the Philippines for Exercise Balikatan '09. This exercise presented the unique challenge of sending the entire **Aviation Combat Element** (ACE) ashore to Clark Air Base in order to participate in joint operations with Filipino Marines. After a weeklong transit past the Straits of Taiwan involving Carrier Qualification proficiency and daily flight planning, the

Squadron made the 50-mile transition ashore. Within hours, a make-shift hangar was set up at the southern end of the airfield and the ACE was fully operational. The next two weeks found Tiger aircraft crisscrossing the entirety of the island of Luzon as HMM-262(REIN) was tasked with a multitude of missions that ranged from Close Air Support of infantry units operating at the Crow Valley Range Complex, to Casualty Evacuation missions to the major metropolitan hospital in Manila, to passenger and cargo movements between Filipino bases. Instructor pilots from the Squadron trained our allied counterparts in Night Vision Goggle operations, terrain flight profiles, and the shipboard environment. This training culminated in the first

ever carrier landing performed by a Filipino helicopter crew and a joint close air support mission by a division of aircraft consisting of an AH-1W SuperCobra, a UH-1N Huey, and a Filipino MD-500 Defender, providing fires in the Crow Valley Range. By executing this wide variety of missions, the squadron showcased the unique ability of the ACE to conduct sustained operations ashore.

Following a successful retrograde from Clark Air Base to ARG shipping and several days of well earned liberty in the port of Subic Bay, the "Flying Tigers" steamed north back to Okinawa to prepare for our next challenge, Exercise Talisman Saber in Queensland, Australia.

Upon return to MCAS
Futenma, the squadron was
rejoined by two recent Weapons
and Tactics Instructor (WTI)
course graduates, Capt Dan
"Squeaky" Schierling and Sgt
Michael Burgett.

Additionally, the Operations Department was augmented by Sgt Robert Heite, newly arrived

on the island. One of the major preparations required for the upcoming exercise in Australia was the need to streamline the tracking of flight hours while operating afloat. Thanks to many hours of hard work put in by SSgt Mercado, Sgt Heite, Cpl Greenough, LCpl Smith, LCpl Moya-Albarracin, and 1stLt Christman, the Operations clerks set up a new database that can be used independently of the sporadic internet connection that often times occurs while conducting blue-water operations. Without a doubt, their efforts drastically reduced the administrative workload necessary during daily flight operations.

As the month of June concluded, the Flying Tigers again embarked aboard vessels from Expeditionary Strike Group Seven for the journey to Australia. The two-week transit involved many days of openocean operations and the opportunity for a few Marines to participate in the traditional "Shellback" ceremony as we crossed the equator into the Southern Hemisphere.

Upon arriving in Australian waters, the squadron pulled into the tropical city of Cairns for a working port visit. This allowed the squadron to conduct some needed aircraft maintenance and accomplish last minute coordination with our Australian counterparts prior to kicking off the exercise.

Talisman Saber '09 provided the "Flying Tigers" with the opportunity to conduct tactical training against a living and

thinking enemy force provided by Australian and U.S. Army Reserve units. On any given mission, the aircraft were able to practice tactical flight techniques such as terrain flight, section mechanics, and aerial reconnaissance. The exercise was an overwhelming success and after a few more days of sailing, the Flying Tigers pulled into the port of Brisbane.

The first order of business upon arrival was a heartfelt farewell to our Commanding Officer, LtCol Doug "Shubone" Schueler. The squadron formed up on the flight deck for the solemn change of command ceremony and welcomed LtCol John "Vegas" Mee as he assumed command of the "Flying Tigers." The squadron returned to Okinawa Aug 12, with the dets returning to Calfornia less than two weeks later.

MAINTENANCE:

The Maintenance Department spent the entire month of April located on Clark Air Base, Philippines, for Exercise Balikatan.

During this time, the Maintenance Marines worked tirelessly in support of the exercise, conducting phase maintenance on two CH-46s and numerous FCFs on all type/model/series aircraft. Additionally, a Remain Behind Team (RBT) stayed on the Essex during the exercise, completing phase maintenance on a UH-1N and FCF on a CH-46. Upon completion of the exercise all aircraft made their scheduled flyon to the USS Essex as the squadron linked back up with it's Legaspi detachment and was once again whole. The conclusion of the month coincided with the end of the exercise and the return of all aircraft and maintainers back to MCAS Futenma.

With another successful fly-on and off accomplished, by May the Maintenance Department had returned to Futenma at full tilt in preparation for Exercise Talisman Saber and the strenuous challenges it would face with inspections by the Australian Quarantine and Inspection Service (AQIS).

During this time the Phrogs showed no signs of slowing down, as they waded through the long and arduous task of meticulously cleaning aircraft in preparation for their AQIS inspections. In the face of this impending task, the Maintenance Marines were still able to complete phase maintenance on a UH-1N, all while supporting a continuous flight schedule. Simultaneously, the Maintenance Department began preparations to accept two new birds from

HMH-465 through C-5 transfer. This coincided with the Squadron sending two CH-53s to SDLM, which required both birds to be inspected and inventoried before shipment to Korea.

Extraordinary efforts were made by Marines across the entire squadron in order to push aircraft through the AQIS process and meet our ARG fly on goals.

With literally no time to spare, all aircraft necessary to accomplish Exercise Talisman Saber safely flew on to the USS Essex. The squadron was able to fly three AH-1Ws, two UH-1Ns, three CH-53s, and all twelve CH-46s. This was in no small way attributed to the relentless efforts of the Maintenance Marines' dedication to returning aircraft to a mission capable status upon completion of the AQIS inspections.

July has seen the maintenance department busy supporting exercise Talisman Saber in Australia. As the exercise winds down, the core squadron Marines look forward to returning to Okinawa while detachment Marines anticipate their return to California.
